GREETINGS:

First, he has guided me in writing this article, to ask you to listen to your heart for what God needs you to do with your faith. Don't say I can't. I have had an amazing journey serving God over the last couple decades. He has always provided the inspiration whether I'm writing an article or giving a sermon. He has given me the words to others and I give Him credit. By following Christ, I am both ashamed, and amazed how people around me have noticed and said, "I didn't know you were a Christian." That's the difference between thinking and actually doing.

Christ is there for you also. He needs you. His church needs you, just like you need Jesus and His church. The world needs another light to shine in this dark world. YOU! There are many ways to serve. Help with Sunday School, serve on the leadership team, prepare communion, visitations, writing cards to those homebound. Oh, so needed. Every job is equally important. That negativity causes so much loss and frustration. You are better than that. "Here I am Lord, Is it I Lord. I hear you calling in the night. I will go Lord, if you lead me. GENERAL CONFERENCE

While it's hard to summarize the entirety of a 10 day conference in a newsletter article, I wanted to help people understand a little more of what happened at General Conference and what it will mean for our congregation. I've taken the condensed report offered by the Minnesota Annual Conference, and have condensed it even more! So without further ado:

Background info about General Conference:

General Conference is The United Methodist Church's top legislative body. It typically meets every four years but was postponed in 2020, so this gathering in 2024 was actually the postponed 2020 General Conference. Each annual conference is allotted a specific number of seated/voting delegates based on its number of professing members. In total, there were approximately 740 delegates from 133 annual conferences. Bishops preside at General Conference but have no voice or vote.

LGBTQ+ inclusion

By a vote of 523 to 161 after about an hour and a half of debate, General Conference delegates eliminated the 52-year-old assertion in the denomination's Social Principles that "the practice of homosexuality... is incompatible with Christian teaching."

The United Methodist Church removed a 40-year ban on the ordination of gay clergy. Delegates approved this decision by a 93 percent margin, without debate, which removed the restrictive language in the Book of Discipline effective at the close of General Conference

United Methodist pastors no longer face potential penalties for officiating at same-sex weddings or being in a same-sex relationship themselves.

Delegates voted to protect the rights of pastors to choose which weddings to perform or not perform by adopting the statement: "No clergy at any time may be required or compelled to perform, or prohibited from performing, any marriage, union, or blessing of any couple, including same-sex couples."

Other key decisions

Delegates approved a series of petitions related to regionalization, which has become United Methodist shorthand for a package of legislation that would restructure the denomination. Under the legislation, the U.S. and each central conference—church regions in Africa, Europe, and the Philippines—would become regional conferences with the same authority to adapt the Book of Discipline, the denomination's policy book, for more missional effectiveness. Currently, only central conferences have the authority to adapt the Discipline as missional needs and different legal contexts require. To be ratified, the regionalization plan will need at least a two-thirds total vote of annual conference lay and clergy voters, so this item will come to the Minnesota Annual Conference Session for a vote.

Delegates voted to grant sacramental authority to deacons. Deacons can now administer baptism and Holy Communion without having to obtain special permission to do so. The sentence in the Book of Discipline now reads: "For the sake of extending the mission and ministry of the church and offering the means of grace to the world, the deacon is authorized to preside at the celebration of the sacraments."

Delegates passed a petition to welcome "with a spirit of grace" churches that have disaffiliated or withdrawn from The United Methodist Church and wish to return.

Delegates voted to reduce the portion of church giving requested to fund the general-church budget.

Delegates voted to enter a full-communion partnership with The Episcopal Church after years of dialogue about this possibility. Full communion means each church acknowledges the other as a partner in the Christian faith, recognizes the validity of each other's baptism and Eucharist, and commits to work together in ministry.

Delegates overwhelmingly approved a new retirement plan for U.S. clergy. Called Compass, the plan was conceived and championed by Wespath, the denomination's pension and benefits agency. Wespath says the switch to the Compass plan is needed to continue providing reliable and sustainable retirement income.

Delegates approved a resolution condemning racialethnic discrimination and gender-based violence against Asian Americans. The resolution calls on annual conferences to urge local churches to be informed and to work against discrimination and gender-based violence.

Delegates approved a variety of resolutions related to creation care.

General Conference has issued a heartfelt apology to all who experienced sexual misconduct in The United Methodist Church. The apology statement was read in its entirety during General Conference, and all United Methodist bishops around the world are to read the apology at their own upcoming annual conferences.

Over the last several years we've been wrestling with what the denominational movement looks like at Grace UMC in regards to human sexuality. As a congregation, we have a multitude of theological understandings surrounding this topic, and yet we share a core agreement to truly practice an open table even beyond our communion celebrations, to live into our general rules of doing no harm, doing good, and staying in love with God, and to welcome all into our church. Those commitments will continue to be lived out with all that we do at Grace. As your pastor who leads a diverse congregation, I'll offer the reminder that I am always willing to have an open and honest conversation one-on-one or in forum settings. I believe we are joining in the commitment from the denomination, "we are moving forward with renewed hope and a focus on mission and ministry as we make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world," as we continue to do our part by being the church of the neighborhood!

PARSONAGE PROJECT

In January Pastor informed the Leadership Team that there have been ongoing issues with moisture on the windows which was leading to wood rot and mold on the jambs and sills. We received quotes for new windows at the parsonage, but were encouraged to take a step back and tackle the root causes and look at the whole project. A home inspector was brought in and found moisture build up in the drywalls under and around most windows in the house. Mold testing results from Pro-Tech also came back positive with a few different types of non-toxic, but problematic molds. Pro-Tech also recommended Radon testing while work was being done on the home, which results came back with elevated levels. The Leadership Team approved Steamatic to come in and remediate the house including air filtering, treating areas with mold, and removing drywall that had moisture issues. After consulting with several contractors, we approved Xpert Xteriors to come and replace the drywall that was removed.

We received several bids from Radon remediation companies and contracted with Valley Radon Services to remediate the Radon and encapsulate the massive crawl space under the house. Upon completion of the encapsulation, humidity levels in the parsonage dropped by 30% in one day. This was reassuring for us as a Leadership Team, as it felt like we found the primary cause of moisture in the home. Following conversations with several contractors, a decision was made that because of the current life span of the windows and status of the window encasements, it would be a wise decision to purchase new windows to invest in the future of the home. These conversations also led us to purchase windows from a lumbar yard and have a contractor install rather than from a

window company.

To date, the parsonage is mold free, radon reduced, moisture controlled, and close to having new windows installed. With it being a relatively new home, there has not been much needing to be done to the house since being built in 2011. The Leadership Team has been hard at work in making decisions that care for the assets and facilities of Grace, cares for the generosity and gifts given to Grace, and cares for the voices and people who serve Grace. In an effort to be transparent as well, we wanted to share a cost breakdown of the project.

Expenses: Mold sampling and testing by ProTech-\$800

Mold remediation by Steamatic-\$11,890 Radon remediation and crawl space encapsulation by Valley

Radon Services-\$11,285

Drywall and insulation fix by Xpert Xterior-\$8,000 Andersen Windows from Crane Johnson- \$17,298 Window installation and patio door repair-\$12,000
